Important historical and cultural values at the times of the Gospels:

The way people thought, what they believed, and the rules they followed back then were very different from today. Historical context means understanding what was happening in the world at that time. Cultural values are the ideas and beliefs that were important to the people back then.

The gospels (which are stories about Jesus) were written over 2,000 years ago. The people who wrote them were living in a world where things like family, religion, and the way they treated each other were very different from what we know today.

For example, in the time of the gospels, many people thought it was very important to follow the rules in the Bible and live in a very close community. The way Jesus taught people about love, kindness, and helping others was super important in that world because it challenged old ideas about who was “important” and who was not.

Not everyone at the time of the gospels thought it was important to follow them.

When the gospels were first written, Jesus' teachings were new and different. Many people in the Jewish community, where Jesus lived, had their own beliefs and ways of following God. Some people liked what Jesus said, like loving others and being kind, but others didn't agree with him. They felt his ideas were strange or too different from their traditional beliefs.

There were also some people who didn't know about Jesus at all because his teachings were mostly shared with a small group of people. And outside of the Jewish community, many other people didn't hear about Jesus until later, after the gospels were spread to more places by his followers.

Over time, more and more people began to follow the teachings of Jesus, and the gospels became very important to those who believed in him. But it took time for the ideas to spread and for people to understand why they were so special. Some people still didn't agree, and there were even groups that tried to stop the spread of Jesus' message.

So, at first, not everyone thought it was important to follow the gospels. It was a gradual process, and it was a bit like how new ideas can take time to be understood and accepted by many people.
